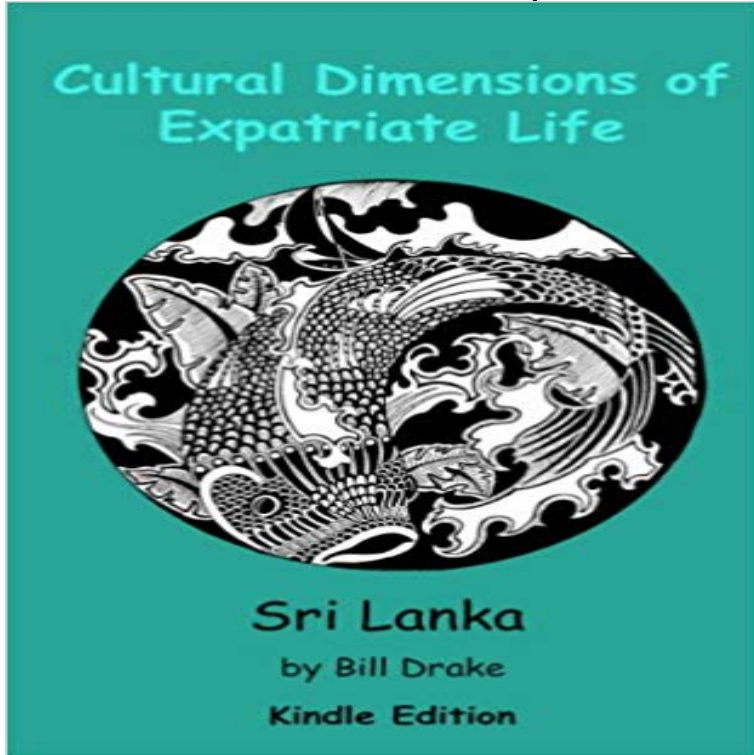


Cultural Dimensions of Expatriate Life in Sri Lanka
